

Welcome in Jesus' Name

Cervical Health Awareness: January is Cervical Health Awareness Month. Cervical cancer screening is used to find changes in the cells of the cervix that could lead to cancer. Screening includes the Pap test and, for some women, testing for human papillomavirus (HPV). Cervical cancer screening is important because it usually takes three to seven years for cervical changes to become cancer. Regular screening gives your provider time to find cervical cell changes and discuss possible treatment before the cell changes become cancer.

What causes cervical cancer? Most cases of cervical cancer are caused by infection with HPV. HPV is a virus that enters cells and can cause them to change. Some types of HPV have been linked to cervical cancer as well as cancer of the vulva, vagina, penis, anus, mouth, and throat. Types of HPV that may cause cancer are known as "high-risk types." HPV is passed from person to person during sexual activity. It is very common, and most people who are sexually active will get an HPV infection in their lifetime. HPV infection often causes no symptoms. Most HPV infections go away on their own. These short-term infections typically cause only mild ("low-grade") changes in cervical cells. The cells go back to normal as the HPV infection clears. But in some women, HPV does not go away. If a high-risk type of HPV infection lasts for a long time, it can cause more severe ("high-grade") changes in cervical cells. High-grade changes are more likely to lead to cancer.

How often should I have screening? How often you should have cervical cancer screening and which tests you should have depend on your age and health history:

- Women aged 21–29 years should have a Pap test alone every 3 years. HPV testing is not recommended.
- Women aged 30–65 years should have a Pap test and an HPV test (*cotesting*) every 5 years (preferred). It also is acceptable to have a Pap test alone every 3 years.

When should I stop having screening? You should stop having screening after age 65 if

- you do not have a history of moderate or severe abnormal cervical cells or cervical cancer, and
- you have had either three negative Pap test results in a row or two negative co-test results in a row within the past 10 years, with the most recent test performed within the past 5 years.

• What if I've had a hysterectomy?

If you have had a hysterectomy, you still may need screening. The decision is based on whether your cervix was removed, why the hysterectomy was needed, and whether you have a history of moderate or severe cervical cell changes or cervical cancer. Even if your cervix is removed at the time of hysterectomy, cervical cells can still be present at the top of the vagina. If you have a history of cervical cancer or cervical cell changes, you should continue to have screening for 20 years after the time of your surgery. These guidelines are from American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology (ACOG). Please consult with your provider on what's best for you. There are safe and effective vaccines available to protect you and your family against HPV infection, which can lead to cancer in males and females. Human papillomavirus vaccines are recommended for all males and females aged 9-26 years to prevent cancer caused by HPV. If you think you or any members of your family need to be vaccinated against HPV, please call your health care provider's office to schedule an appointment. If you are younger than 27 years and have not received the HPV vaccine, please contact our office to schedule an appointment today for your first dose.
