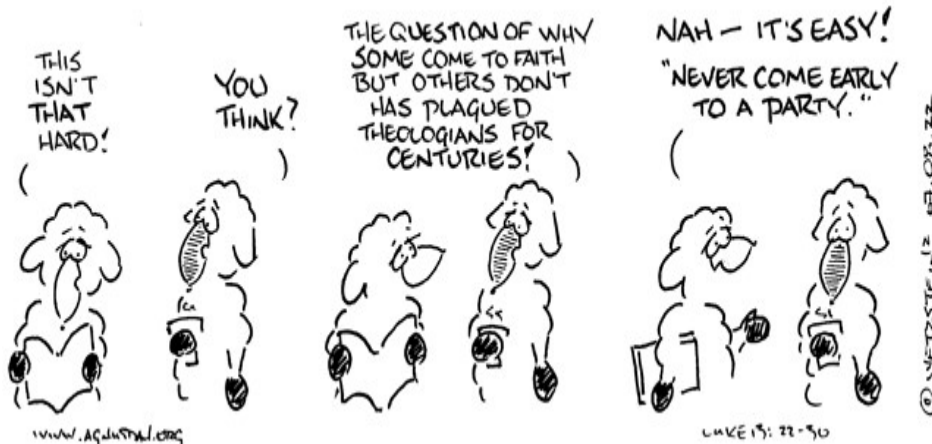

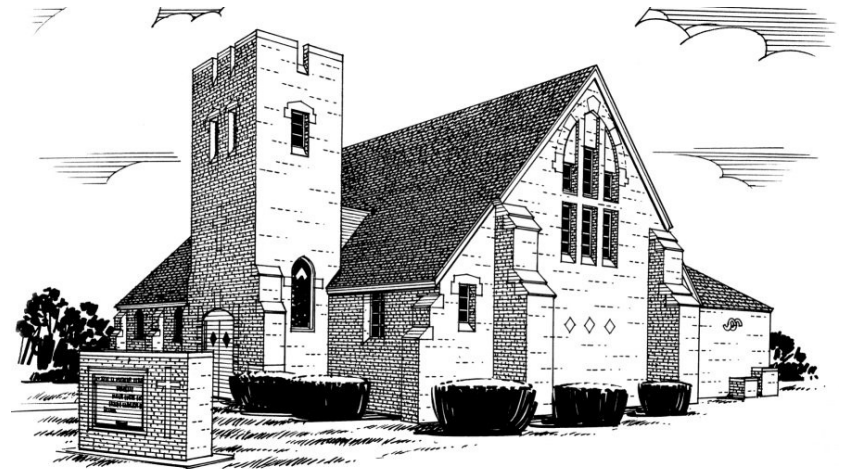

Spiders. Oh my!

Lovely spider webs blowing in the cool breeze or glistening with the morning dew. Then you walk into one unexpectedly. Sticky strings across your face. Most of the time all you get is that yucky feeling as you try to clear the sticky mess. Fortunately, most times no spider bite occurs. Spider bites may cause pain, redness, itching, and swelling at the bite site. In some people, symptoms may last several days. A few people have severe allergic reactions that can be life threatening. Talk with your provider about getting an allergy kit with epinephrine.

Spider bites are rarely serious unless you have an allergic reaction. Two venomous spiders found in the United States are the black widow and brown recluse. A bite from either of these two spiders could produce a severe reaction that needs medical attention right away.

Black widow spiders can be up to 2 inches long and are shiny black with a red or yellow hourglass mark on their undersides. Brown recluse (fiddler) spiders are about ½ inch long and have long legs. They are brown with a violin shaped mark on their heads.

Symptoms of spider bites may include:

- Itching or rash
- Pain radiating from the site of the bite
- Muscle pain or cramping

- Reddish to purplish color or blister
- Increased sweating
- Difficulty breathing
- Headache
- Nausea and vomiting
- Fever
- Chills
- Anxiety or restlessness
- High blood pressure

First Aid

- Stay calm. Identify the spider type if possible.
- Wash the bite area with soap and water.
- Apply a paste of baking soda or meat tenderizer. Topical antihistamine may help also.
- Take an antihistamine to reduce pain, swelling and itching. Read the label before taking.
- Apply a cold cloth or ice pack to the bite to reduce swelling.
- Elevate bite area if possible.
- Do not apply a tourniquet or remove venom.

Severe reactions need immediate professional medical attention, call 911. Talk with your provider about your symptoms or previous reactions to spider bites.
