

Three Questions To Ask Your Doctor

For All Men

- 1. Am I at higher risk for prostate cancer considering my age, race, or family history?
- **2.** Can you help me make a plan for testing given my personal risk? What tests will this include?
- **3.** What lifestyle changes can reduce my risk?

Not including skin cancer, prostate cancer is the most common type of cancer in American men.

Who is at risk?

Age is the most common risk factor. The older the man is, the greater the risk.

African -American men are at greater risk than other men. They get prostate cancer at a younger age, tend to have more advanced disease when diagnosed and tend to have a more severe type of prostate cancer than other men.

Family history of prostate cancer increases your risk. Men who have a father, son, or brother with prostate cancer are at an increased risk. Men with three or more first-degree relatives, or two close relatives on the same side of the family with prostate cancer may have a type of cancer that is inherited.

Men who are not African-American and do not have a family history of prostate cancer are at average risk.

Should I get screened?

Men who are 55 to 69 years old should make individual decisions about being screened with a prostate specific antigen (PSA) blood test.

Talk with your provider about the benefits and harms of screening for prostate cancer.

Men who are 70 years old and older should not be screened routinely.

This recommendation applies to men who:

- Are at average risk for prostate cancer.
- Are at increased risk for prostate cancer.
- Do not have symptoms of prostate cancer.
- Have never been diagnosed with prostate cancer.

What lifestyle might increase my risk?

- Men who eat lots of red meat or high-fat dairy products appear to have slightly
 higher chance of getting prostate cancer. These men tend to eat fewer fruits and
 vegetables. It's unclear as to which one may be increasing the risk.
- Being obese does not seem to increase one's risk for developing prostate cancer but obese men had a higher risk of getting more aggressive prostate cancer.
- There is some evidence that firefighters can be exposed chemicals that may increase the risk of prostate cancer. A few studies have suggested a possible link between exposure to Agent Orange and prostate cancer.

Talk with your medical provider about being screened for prostate cancer.
