

THE DAY OF PENTECOST

Service Notes: "The Risen Lord Jesus Pours Out the Holy Spirit" The Lord took "some of the Spirit" that was on Moses "and put it on the seventy elders" of Israel (Num. 11:25), and they "prophesied in the camp" (Num. 11:26). In the same way, our risen Lord Jesus poured out His Holy Spirit at the Feast of Pentecost — the 50th day and the "Eighth Sunday" of Easter. When "a sound like a mighty rushing wind" and "tongues as of fire appeared" and rested on each of the 12 apostles, "they were all filled with the Holy Spirit" and proclaimed "the mighty works of God" (Acts 2:2-4, 11). The Lord Jesus grants this same Spirit to His Church on earth to proclaim Him glorified on the cross and risen victorious from the grave for us sinners. From His open heart, our crucified and risen Lord pours out His Holy Spirit in "rivers of living water" (John 7:38) and invites everyone who thirsts to come to Him and drink freely (John 7:37). Through this life-giving work of the Holy Spirit, we hear our pastors "telling in our own tongues the mighty works of God" (Acts 2:11), and "everyone who calls upon the name of the Lord shall be saved" (Acts 2:21). Red paraments are the color of blood and fire. As the color of fire, it reminds us of the zeal of those first apostles who were empowered to start the church by God the Holy Spirit. As the color of blood, we are reminded of the cost of following our Lord, sometimes meaning selfsacrifice.

"Sequence for Pentecost", which is the long chant you will hear today, represents a part of the communion liturgy that was common in the middle ages. When making the transition from Epistle to Gospel, it is common to sing "Alleluia", as we do now. That was "dressed up" in the ancient church with a long "sequence" that accompanied the Alleluia, especially in larger church buildings. The Gospel was always read from among the people, and so several of the clergy would process in ceremony with a large book containing the Gospels to around the center of the church. This was to represent how Jesus, Who is God's good news (Gospel) "became flesh and dwelt among us" (John 1:14). Jesus came to live with us, "Immanuel", God is with us. The "sequence" part of this music set up the Gospel and agreed with the theme of the day. Nick Haggin assembled this text, sung three times through; first in Latin, then in German, and finally in English. We did it this way to honor the day of Pentecost, a day when the Holy Spirit came. Evidence oft the Spirit's coming was not only "fire" on the heads of the apostles, but also their ability to speak in other languages. Latin was the language of the Western Church for many years. From the time of the Reformation, it was German. Of course, German came to these shores through immigration, and now English the language of our church.
