Psalms 107:1

From Pastor McPike...

"Were not ten cleansed? Where are the nine? 18 Was no one found to return and give praise to God except this *foreigner?*" 19 And he said to him, "Rise and go your way; your faith has <u>t</u>made you well." (Luke 17:17b-19)

That quote comes from the Gospel lesson that was appointed to have been read on October 10, when we at Osman celebrated LWML Sunday. (Luke 17:11-19) Ten lepers were cured of a life threatening disease. Only one returned to say "thank you". It shows how there are many recipients of goodness, but not many return to actually "give thanks."

That calls me up short. I don't say "thank you" nearly enough for the good things that I have been given. I don't send "thank you notes", appealing to either "I'm too busy" with my two+ jobs, college search for Sara, school activities and other things for kids; but everyone is busy, and they usually find time to write them. I also could appeal to "it's the woman's job", (after all, when thank you notes are sent, usually it is the WIFE who sends them from a couple, right?) ... since there isn't anyone like that for me right now, I just ignore the job; but that is terribly sexist, and I don't like the way it sounds. So I will just confess my sin and say, I'm sorry that I don't do it, and I'm working at trying to be better.

Truth is, I have a lot to be thankful for. I have two really great children, and I have a really great close friend who is good support in a variety of times. My parents are still alive and doing well, even regularly making the journey between their home in Southern Indiana and the Gulf Coast of Alabama near Mobile. I'm a board certified chaplain, and I have a full -time job in a profession (chaplain) that I sought for many years. I pastor a wonderful church in the

country with people who have treated me very well. Many pastors should be so lucky! Many of you think of me and show it by cards, gifts and comments throughout the year. Quarterly Voters Meeting Minutes October 6, 2013 (Abridged Edition)

Chairman Rick Hardesty called the quarterly voters meeting to order on October 6, after the regular worship service. 37 members were in attendance.

Secretary's minutes were read and approved. Treasurer, Bob Zimmerman, reported the third quarter cash balance as \$93,149. 91. Report was approved.

Pastor McPike thanked all of the members for the on-going ministry of our church. He stressed that stewardship is far more than money in the treasury. We can use our time, talents, and treasures to spread the news of salvation throughout our communities.

John Gercken reported that the lighting upgrade has been completed in the annex. The council has contacted the references for Kross Tuck Pointing, and they were all very satisfied with the work done by them. Therefore, we will be signing a contract with them to do our church and annex. The work will begin in the spring. We are still collecting bids for the gutters.

Chairman Hardesty thanked all of the members who cleaned the church in September. In thanks for all of the construction work that Dick Johnson does for our church, a quilt was purchased for Dick and Deb at the Habitat Sale in Shipshewana, Indiana. Darwin made the motion to reimburse Donnie Warsaw \$850 for the purchase of the quilt. Esther Lutz seconded. Motion carried.

Chairman Hardesty made mention of the need to clean and organize the storage shed. The items that are stored in there and no longer used will be offered to the members and what is not wanted will be discarded. Brenda Hendricks will be working on this project so watch bulletin articles for more information.

There are still positions to be filled for the council slate. We are in need of a chairman, 2 elders, 1 trustee, assistant Sunday school superintendent, assistant financial director, and head usher. Please consider using your time and talents to fill these positions. The sign-up sheet is on the back bulletin board.

Barb Whitehouse-Gercken made the motion to adjourn the meeting. Jeff Warsaw seconded. Motion carried. The meeting closed with the Lord's Prayer.

6 members, plus Pastor McPike, attended the monthly council meeting held on October 1, in the fellowship hall.

Secretary's minutes were read and approved. Treasurer Bob Zimmerman, reported the cash balance being \$93,149.51. Report was approved. The Fisher Food Pantry will be the recipient of our October mission giving.

Pastor McPike reported that Pastor Ehlers will be preaching on October 28th while he is attending a chaplain retreat in North Carolina. Pastor thanked Alicia and the trumpeters - Sara McPike, and Jared Hatcher for the special music on September 29th.

Chairman Hardesty discussed with the elders that at times they may have to be the substitute acolytes and the substitute ushers.

The trustees reported that the repair of the lights in the annex has been completed. Chairman Hardesty checked on the references for Kross Tuck Pointing. All of the references were very pleased. Since the voters gave their approval at the special voters meeting in early September to hire them to do the tuck pointing of the church and annex, we asked for a proof of insurance and a formal contract. We are waiting for bids for the guttering. We have received a quote from Alternative Enterprises for grading and leveling of the dirt after the gutters are installed to get the water away from the building. .

The sign up sheet for the slate of officers for 2014 for the council is posted on the back bulletin board.

There was further discussion on installing internet in the church and fellowship hall. It was decided not to pursue this project until after the tuck pointing is completed.

The council approved cleaning of the storage shed and getting rid of some of the stored items. Brenda will organize this as a Thrivent project.

The next council meeting will be November 5th. The next quarterly voters meeting will be Sunday, October 6^{th} .

Internet at the Church? Why?

In the past few years, the question of having an Internet connection at Immanuel has come up more than once at church council meetings. In each case, it was decided that having Internet is not really necessary.

This may be true today. But the Internet has evolved from being a "novelty" to what more and more people would consider a basic utility. More and more people have not only a connection to the Internet, but a high speed connection.

In the following, a few "Questions and Answers" about Internet will give some general understanding as to how it can be helpful. We don't have it today, and we may not have it for a while to come, but there are more and more ways it could prove useful as time goes on.

Why have Internet? There is nobody here most of the week to use it.

That's a true enough concern. However, as was pointed out at the September meeting of the church council, the telephone service at the church could be viewed the same way: there is telephone service at the church for the few possible times the building is occupied and might need it. In fact, with most people carrying a cell phone today, there is probably less need than ever for phone service at the church. The only real reason to maintain phone service at the church today is to maintain the directory listing for the telephone with local phone companies, for inclusion in their phone books. Actually, what is probably true is, if Internet were to be installed in the church and made available via "wifi" (wireless connection that phones and tablets can use), it would probably be used many times more on a regular basis than the telephone service is right now. In fact, telephones work over the Internet, and cost much less than conventional land-lines. Many homes no longer even have a telephone line to them at all. Instead, if there still are "conventional" looking telephones, they are hooked by a "box" to the Internet and use that instead. The major disadvantage is, since no local phone company is involved, there is no entry in the phone book.

Let's look at another aspect of the statement, "There is nobody here most of the week to use it." This probably comes from thinking that the office computer would be the only thing connected to the Internet, and so someone sitting in the office on the computer would be the only way in which the Internet would be used. However, there are many more uses for Internet than just someone physically sitting at the desk in the Pastor's office.

The office computer needs an internet connection to

stay updated. Computers today rely on having a regular connection to the Internet in order to receive important software (program) updates, even to stay current with the correct time. The office computer requires that someone take the time to check and set its clock right now, because it is not connected to the Internet. While that task may sound simple enough, because most computers are Internet connected, it is a task that few think about. Why is the time on the office computer important? The office computer records the church services. If the internal clock of the computer is off, the automatic recordings of the church services will be off by the same amount.

The AED needs an internet connection. The new AED device in the Annex would make good use of an internet connection. Certainly, we can get by without such a connection, but if the device were connected, then it would automatically be monitored and updated from the manufacturer. If any trouble developed with it, the manufacturer would know and could alert us to these problems.

Its not just about someone at the church using the Internet, its about workers away from the church reaching in. What is meant by that? Well, as has already been pointed out, nobody is regularly in the office at Immanuel, and as such, it could be argued that Internet is not necessary. However, a connection to the Internet would allow workers away from Osman to connect back into the church from a remote location (such as from home). As copy machine technology improves, this could even mean that copies for meetings or Bible class could be printed ahead of time simply by sending a few commands from a remote location. Again... a necessity? Not really, but certainly another bit of evidence in favor

A new copy machine will probably make good use of the Internet. The service contract on our current copier has expired, meaning that we are using the machine on a month-by-month basis right now. While it continues to function, and we hope that it will for some time to come, when it is replaced, the newer device may well be able to be monitored and maintained from a central location through the Internet.

Smartphones of members would work better if Osman had an Internet connection. Likely objections to this are, if people are at the church, they should not be on their smart phones. The other side of that is, smart phones, and tablet computers are becoming more used all the time. They usually come with a data plan that allows them to be on the Internet through a cell connection. One issue is, it takes a better quality cell signal to put a smart phone on the Internet than it does to just make phone calls or text. Cell phone service at

Osman is marginal, and often the connection is too slow for smart phones to be practical. There have been times during council meetings when looking something up at the last minute could have moved things along with the meeting, but the cell phone internet connection just wasn't doing the job.

Other devices will, in time, probably be internet connected. It is already possible to install thermostats that are connected to the Internet. The temperature of the church could be monitored and adjusted without having to make a special trip.

Other possibilities include "live streaming" of the church service, where instead of waiting for the service to be mailed using CDs, one could go to an internet site, possibly on a smart phone, to listen, or possibly listen and watch the service live.

Times are changing. Technology changes. I'm sure that 75 years ago, there were likely similar discussions about whether or not the church needed a telephone. Does Osman need Internet? The answer to that question will vary with the person asking. As the church council has discussed this in various council meetings over the years, the answer in the past has always ended up being "no". However, the number of reasons in favor of Internet grows each time the issue is considered.

No decisions on this issue have been made. It may come before Voters in the future, possibly as early as January, maybe later. But as time and technology move along, it is something to consider.

Thanks to Connie Warsaw and Diana Zimmerman for visiting our shut-ins during the month of October.


Storage Shed Clean Out Project!
