From the desk of Pastor Deen...

"Chiggers"

Well it is upon us, and boy does it feel good. Just months ago, we were muttering under our breath, slipping and sliding on the ice, and asking ourselves, why do we live in Illinois, where the winters are so darn cold. But now it's here, and while the "official" day isn't until June 21st, summer is here. If you haven't yet, chances are you are gearing up for the first grill session of the year. You are looking forward to the little league ball games and the trips to Dairy Queen afterwards. The kids are giddy knowing that school is off the radar and you can't wait to take that first coveted swim. Summer is here...let's make a checklist to make sure we have everything. Grill... check. Sunscreen...check. Summer reading list for the kids...check...and insect repellent...check.

We all know the importance of insect repellent don't we? While summer is nice, mosquitoes can ruin a cookout quicker than rain, and make the seventh inning stretch at a ball game seem like an eternity. I worked at a camp one year and I was annoyingly introduced to a bug that I had never heard of before. That bug was a chigger. I don't know how many of you know what a chigger is, but let me tell you they are an insect that you would rather not deal with. Chiggers are small insects that while I have never seen one with a naked eye, I have felt the unpleasant wrath of them. To my knowledge, there is no repellent to them, no proven cure for their "bite." Chiggers feed on the fluids in your skin cells. They inject a digestive enzyme that ruptures the cells. The enzyme forms a straw for chiggers to suck on the skin cell fluids. Translation, when they bite it doesn't hurt, but the itch of chigger bite has no equal.

I remember once I had gotten a chigger bite

on my foot, and one night as I was trying to sleep, my foot started itching so, so very badly. So I started scratching so, so very hard. It felt so, so good to scratch this bite on my foot...but the strange thing was, while it felt so good to scratch, the more and more I scratched, the more and more my foot itched. I must've scratched my foot for a good 5 minutes, before I told myself to simply 'STOP'! So I stopped, but I couldn't sleep. That itch was driving me crazy. So I started back scratching it...this time more furiously, and harder...five minutes later with the itch just being unbearable...I told myself once to simply 'STOP'! And I did, this time for a full six minutes. I couldn't stop; this hands down was the worst itch ever. So after engaging in this routine three or four times, I was scratching and I suddenly noticed my fingers were wet...I groped in the dark trying to find my flashlight, I shined the beam of light on my foot, and it was then that I realized what had just happened.

My foot was bleeding...YUCK! I had been told that chiggers will make you scratch to the point of drawing blood, but I thought that was just an exaggeration, I had no idea it was true. I literally had scratched my foot to the point in which it bled. I realized what I had done, embarrassed by it all, I wiped away the blood from my foot, and laid down. The sad thing was, it took every ounce of will power I had in every deep fiber in my body to not scratch my bloody foot. While that story is rather embarrassing, doesn't that just sum it up for both you and me? Are we not that guy in our cabin at camp vigorously trying to scratch our foot away...or should I say vigorously trying to cover up our sin that enslaves us.

We lie to our family, drink to the point of drunkenness, delete the "History" bar on our computer and just flat out deny that we have a problem while we curse God under our breath. It's a song that is as old as time. We see in 2 Samuel, King David dealt with this

same problem, as he went so far as to use his power to have his friend murdered to cover his sin that he had committed. Sin was on the verge of driving David mad, and possibly destroying his kingdom. No matter how many times I read and hear the story of King David, and his sin towards Bathsheba and Uriah, I always marvel at 2 Samuel 12 v.13. As Nathan has just confronted David with the terrible actions that he has done...David said six words: "I have sinned against the Lord." Nothing poetic or groundbreaking...he just admitted his sin...and just like that Nathan said "The Lord has taken away your sin...".

While David still had to deal with the consequence of his sin...he was forgiven for the sin that he had committed. No hoops to jump through, no special ceremonies to perform, no blood that needed to be shed...at least not by David. The blood had already been shed by Christ, and it's for our sins that we too try so hard to cover that he died. Forgiveness of our greatest sin has been won for us on Calvary...no need to scratch that itch...it's already been scratched. All we have to do is ask. I really wish it was that easy to get rid of chiggers.

Osman Lutheran Church Council Meeting April 1, 2015

The Immanuel Lutheran Church Council met on April 1st with 9 members present. Those present: Rick Hardesty, Bob Zimmerman, Debbie Lammle, Steve Martin, Aaron Warsaw, Annette Warsaw, Susan Martin, Diana Zimmerman, and Pastor McPike.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Hardesty. Pastor's message was from Psalm 31:9. Secretary, Debbie Lammle, read the minutes from the March 4th and 5th Council meetings. Annette Warsaw made the motion to approve the minutes and Aaron Warsaw seconded. Motion carried.

Treasurer's report was given with a balance of \$73,539.86. Steve Martin made a motion to accept the report and Aaron Warsaw seconded; motion carried. Bob Zimmerman made the motion to give our May monthly mission donation to St. John's Lutheran School in Champaign and the June monthly donation to St. Judes. Susan Martin seconded; motion carried.

Pastor then gave his report. He stated that there are increased requests for summer vicars and we don't have one assigned to Osman as yet. On April 14th Pastor McPike will begin an adult Bible class every Tuesday at 6:30pm for 10-14 weeks. The class is open to anyone in the congregation.

There will be homemade bread and wine served at the Maundy Thursday and Easter morning services.

Pastor continues his Sunday morning Bible Class on Daniel. The children's catechism class continues on Sunday morning, taught by Debbie Lammle. Pastor suggested a catechism camp, directed by our summer vicar, be held this summer.

Discussion continued concerning the increased amount of reserved propane gas needed for the year. Decision won't be decided till May when the prices might decrease.

The contract on the copier and functions needing adjustment was then discussed.

Trent Swift from Country Insurance and Financial Services gave a very detailed summary of our insurance coverage on the church and fellowship hall. He stated that we were very adequately insured and feels great about the policy we have. He did suggest placing the fire extinguishers in a more visible location.

Old Business:

Sunday School Superintendent, Annette Warsaw, stated that VBS will be held either the week of July 5th or July 12th. Material from CPH has been ordered.

It was stated that the mowing schedule will be placed on the bulletin board in the back of the church and in the May newsletter.

Chief Bauer will be inspecting the air conditioning units in May.

Jeff and Annette Warsaw spoke with J Tandy Designs Inc. concerning updating the audio system at Immanuel Osman to improve the overall sound and enhance the clarity in the rear of the church. Handouts were passed out outlining the estimated cost for improvements to be made. Another quote was also requested from electrician, Brandon Clemmons. No decisions were made concerning this topic.

New Business:

Blinds, trash cans, and bus tubs were purchased for the Fellowship Hall. Accounts were set up under Osman Lutheran Church at Lowe's and GFS.

Annette Warsaw passed around examples of thankyou cards she had designed for use by the church. The majority of the council liked the design with the church photos included.

Discussion was held on events held at Immanuel Osman without the use of our paid staff. This was tabled till the next meeting..

Chairman Hardesty referred to a detailed handout given to each council member concerning the expenses incurred with the kitchen restoration.

Shirley Sprau, president of Ladies Aid, will be contacted to organize a group of ladies to put the kitchen back in order. It was recommended by the church council to leave the water heater and extra refrigerator on at all times.

Discussion continued on placement of drink supplies and Sunday School materials in the Fellowship Hall. Aaron Warsaw made a motion to adjourn. Diana Zimmerman seconded. Meeting adjourned with the Lord's Prayer.

SUMMER VICAR UPDATE


