From Pastor McPike...

In the same way He took the cup also after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in My blood; do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of Me." (1 Cor. 11:25)

We hear these words each time we celebrate the Lord's Supper, or Holy Communion. In these words we hear the command to celebrate the Lord's Supper frequently. "Do this... often." But how often is often?

"Often" has meant different things over the years. For centuries, from the time of the early church on to the later middle ages in Europe, "often" meant at least weekly, and also included major festivals of the church. The earliest church calendar to develop was only a weekly cycle, with each Friday being a day of fasting to remember the death of Jesus on "Good Friday", and each Sunday being a day of celebration to remember the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. As the church calendar expanded into a yearlong period, this weekly cycle was still evident through the late Middle ages. A good example of this comes in the season of Lent. Lent, which begins on Ash Wednesday, is said to be a "forty-day" period of time. Yet counting the days from Ash Wednesday to the day before Easter reveals that the period is actually 46 days long. What is the difference? The Sundays in Lent were not considered to be part of Lent. In much older times, when the influence of Christianity was such that many people fasted during the season of Lent, Sundays were not included in the fast, or were days when the fasting was broken. Sunday was always seen as a "mini-Easter", even during Lent. As such, the minimum time that Communion was celebrated was each and every Sunday. Additionally, other "holy days" falling during the week were also occasions for the celebration of Holy Communion. Lutherans in Europe continue this tradition to this day.

The Lutheran Church finding itself in America did not fare so well. There are a couple of reasons for this. One reason is that early in its history, Lutheran churches in America did not have enough pastors, and one pastor may have visited remote outpost congregations only occasionally. Also, American Lutheranism of the 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> Century became infected with what became known as "pietism", which puts a strong emphasis on "being prepared" for communion. Now, certainly we are to be prepared in the sense that we recognize our sinfulness, desire to flee from sin and receive the power of God in Communion to help us do just that. But the influence of "pietism" shifted the focus of Holy Communion more from it being a gift where God gives us His forgiveness and power to live the Christian life toward "how ready am I for communion". There was also some additional logic that suggested that were we to have communion too often, it would not be "special" any longer. Compare that to other life-sustaining processes... such as breathing, for instance. If we would only breathe 5 times or so per minute or less so that we can emphasize how special air is (and we would die without air), how well would we function?

All this explains how "often" ended up being something other than "at least every Sunday". But it does not answer the question of today. "How often is often?" How often should we be having communion? Local traditions often dictate this. There are some at Osman who can tell us of their memory of communion being celebrated four times in a year, something that was not at all uncommon back in the early 20<sup>th</sup> Century in American Lutheranism. From there, the frequency was increased to once each month. Later, churches would adopt twice per month communion.

The Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod passed the following resolution at its 1995 convention: [The Synod in convention encourages] pastors and congregations to study the scriptural, confessional, and historical witness

to every Sunday communion with a view to recovering the opportunity for receiving the Lord's Supper each Lord's Day." (Resolution 2-08A, 1995) Because of this resolution, with an eye toward the long-term history of the church from the earliest times, more and more of our congregations are moving toward having Communion every Sunday. Trinity in Urbana did so already back in the later 1990s not long after this resolution was adopted. St. John in Champaign has practiced it for only the past few years. University Lutheran has a longer history of doing so.

The Lord Jesus did not say "have communion every Sunday". The wording says "as often" meaning to do it regularly and often but not setting a legalistic requirement on it. Still, how often is often? Changing local traditions can be quite troubling for a congregation. The local tradition at Osman in recent history has been to consider the first and third Sundays of each month Communion Sundays. Other Sundays, then, will be "non-communion". In months where there are five Sundays, that meant the last two were "non-communion".

The proposal presented at the June meeting of the Church Council is that we slightly shift that policy. Instead of saying that we have Communion on the First and Third Sundays, we will now indicate that our regular practice is to not have communion on the Second and Fourth Sundays. This would seem to state our current practice only from a different direction. In a way, it is. But in another way, it reflects a change in attitude. To say that communion is celebrated on the First and Third Sundays is to say, in effect, "we do it only a couple times a month." To shift that to noncommunion Sundays being the Second and Fourth Sundays of the month is to say, "we regularly have communion except on two Sundays each month, which are usually the second and fourth." Doing this, we also consider that there will be second or fourth Sundays that are festivals where we will also add communion.

How often is often? The Bible does not answer this question with a legalistic timeline or requirement. Receiving communion often is a Gift from God, not a legalistic demand of the Law. However, as we look at what we get from communion,

forgiveness of our sins strength for our faith

a special bond of fellowship with God and with fellow Christians

...the question that could rather be asked is, "Why can't we do this *more often*?"

Effectively, by shifting from a tradition of stating

that we have communion on "First and Third" to a tradition of having non-communion "Second and Fourth", we are only adding four Communion Sundays each year. But more than that, we are changing the way in which we are emphasizing the importance of this sacred meal for our Christian lives and for the life of the Church. It is our regular practice to do it, and only to take two Sundays a month off to not do it.


The Church Council will meet on Wednesday, August 5 at 7:00 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall.

## <u>Immanuel Lutheran Church of Osman</u> <u>Voter's Meeting- April 12, 2015</u>

The Immanuel Lutheran Church of Osman Voter's Meeting was held on April 12, 2015 immediately after church with 36 members present. Chairman Hardesty called the meeting to order. Pastor began with prayer and a reading from Psalm 148. Secretary, Debbie Lammle, read the minutes from the January 11th Voter's Meeting. Annette Warsaw made a motion to approve the minutes; Butch Sprau seconded; motion carried. Bob Zimmerman gave the treasurer's report for the first quarter with a balance of \$73, 539.86. Don Warsaw made a motion to approve the report; John Gercken seconded; motion carried. Bob Zimmerman explained that money will be reimbursed for the hall expenses by our insurance company, and the purchase of the three sinks was made possible from the Sprau's memorial money. Bob thanked the Sprau family, as well as everyone for their generous offerings and those who worked diligently to get the kitchen functional in time for the Easter breakfast.

#### Pastor's Report:

Pastor started his report by quoting I Corinthians 12:12. "The body is a unit, though it is made up of many parts; and though all its parts are many, they form one body. So it is with Christ." Pastor stated that this illustrates the unity and diversity of the different gifts exercised by God's people here at Osman. Pastor expressed his thanks to everyone who helped with the kitchen repair. He continued by inviting the congregation to an adult Catechism class on Tuesday evenings at 6:30pm in the Fellowship Hall. The class

will continue for 10-14 weeks. Pastor expressed a concern that there may not be enough summer vicars to go around, and therefore Immanuel Osman may not get one.

The CID District Convention will be held in Springfield from July 6-8<sup>th</sup>. A lay delegate may be sent from our congregation. This topic will be discussed at the May Council meeting.

### **Old Business:**

Chairman Hardesty thanked Annette, Jeff, and Don Warsaw for designing and mounting the Easter banner on Front Street in Osman. He continued thanking all the talented individuals who helped with the repairs to the Fellowship Hall, including Dick Johnson, Bill McCleary, Don Warsaw, Butch Sprau, Steve Warsaw, Bob Zimmerman, Steve Martin, Lee Whitehouse, and Jeff Warsaw. Other thanks were given to the janitors, Ladies Aid, LWML, and everyone who helped get the kitchen back in order.

### **New Business:**

An album of pictures showing the damage and progress on repairs was compiled for church records and for the congregation's viewing. Treasurer, Bob Zimmerman, put together a folder of expenses incurred during the repairs to the Fellowship Hall, a total of \$6,397.03.

The group was given an update on the inspection made by the Country Insurance and Financial Service. Although minor adjustments were suggested, the Insurance agent stated that Immanuel Osman is adequately insured and he feels great about the current policy. Chairman Hardesty informed the voters of the locations of the fire extinguishers in the church and fellowship hall as well as the AED located on the west wall in the annex. Training for the AED device has been provided for several members of our congregation. An additional phone is now located on the secretary's desk in the annex.

Bob Zimmerman made a motion to hire Illini Home Improvements to install spray foam in the crawl space under the kitchen as per estimated cost of \$536. Shane Zimmerman seconded the motion; motion carried.

A special thanks was given to Pastor McPike for providing a temperature probe to be placed in the crawl space that will alert him when temperatures drop to detrimental lows.

Several members of the congregation and council members have suggested that we change some operational procedures in the hall. After lengthy discussion, the members present agreed with the council's recommendation to leave the hot water heaters and the second refrigerator on all the time.

Bottled water will be kept in the second refrigerator for anyone to use while at the church or fellowship hall. Chairman Hardesty stated that we will track the utility bills to determine the cost difference after the appliances have remained on.

It was brought to the attention of the group that a slight amount of mold is present near the ceiling fans at the top of the church, and keeping the AC at a lower temperature might help with this problem. Discussion on this topic will be held at the next council meeting.

The next council meeting will be held May 6<sup>th</sup> at 7pm and the next Voter's meeting will be July 5, 2015. Motion to adjourn was made by Barb Whitehouse Gercken, seconded by Theresa VanWakeman Wilson; motion carried. The meeting ended with the Lord's Prayer.

# Osman Lutheran Church Council Meeting June 3, 2015

The Osman Lutheran Church Council met on June 3<sup>rd</sup> in the Fellowship Hall with seven members present. Those attending included Rick Hardesty, Zimmerman, Debbie Lammle, Susan Martin, Diane Zimmerman, Connie Warsaw, and Pastor McPike. The meeting was called to order by Chairman Hardesty. Pastor McPike read a passage from the Gospel of John. Secretary, Debbie Lammle, read the minutes from the May Council meeting. Diane Zimmerman made a motion to accept the minutes. Connie Warsaw seconded. Motion carried. Bob Zimmerman read the treasurer's report with a balance of \$75,131.20. Motion made by Debbie Lammle to approve; second by Connie Warsaw; motion carried. Bob Zimmerman stated that the new contract for propane gas was set at \$435.27 a month, which averages out to \$1.368 per gallon.

Pastor McPike suggested giving our monthly mission contribution to Lutheran Church Missouri Synod in Seoul, South Korea in care of Elliot and Serena Derricks. Debbie Lammle made a motion to give July's monthly mission gift to the Lutheran Church in Seoul and the August contribution to LWR. Susan Martin seconded; motion carried. Diana Zimmerman made a motion to give to the Blue Ridge back pack program in September, Fisher food pantry in October, and the Mahomet food pantry in November. Connie Warsaw seconded; motion carried.

<u>Pastor's Report</u>: Pastor McPlke reported that the adult catechism class was going well with eight people attending on average. Pastor is recording the classes

and placing online for those interested to listening from home. Pastor then stated that the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod is recommending that churches offer communion more often. Therefore Pastor suggested that every 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday of the month, Immanuel Osman offer the Lord's Supper. The council approved his suggestion. Pastor will place this announcement in the August newsletter. Pastor then suggested that we reach out to the families in Osman by placing VBS door hangers on the homes in Osman.

<u>Trustees Report</u>: The council was informed the trustees are still looking for someone to check the mold at the top of the church, and work on the fascia will be done by Dick Johnson later in the summer.

Immanuel Osman already has a maintenance agreement for the church heating/AC units until the end of fall. When this contract expires, the council will get an estimate from Chief Bauer for one contract covering all the units in the Church and Fellowship Hall combined. By October Voter's meeting, the council will try to obtain a second quote for maintenance agreements for all AC and heating units for our members to review.

Bob Zimmerman met with the LP representative at the church. Separate shut-offs (at no charge) were installed at the annex and church and a pressure leak repaired.

Organist, Alicia Haggin, will contact a substitute organist for the Sundays she will be gone on maternity leave.

The July Council meeting will be changed to July 8<sup>th</sup> and the annual Voter's meeting to July 12<sup>th</sup>. Discussion was held concerning a possible 125<sup>th</sup> Centennial Celebration. Updating baptisms, confirmations, and weddings was discussed. Approval from the congregation will be brought up at the next voter's meeting.

Meeting adjourned with the Lord's Prayer.


### <u>Seminarian</u>
