From the desk of Pastor McPike

"Coming"

Railroad tracks cut Philo in half about like they cut off Osman from traffic to the west. The track between Philo and Tolono is rather flat, and it is possible to see the train coming almost from that distance when crossing the track on 130. (Unfortunately, we live south of the tracks... and so when a train comes through it cuts us off from Urbana AND Osman, at least the direct route).

I'm always fascinated by how the train can be observed coming down the track. Whether slow or fast, the motion of the train coming for a long time is constant and deliberate as it rolls down the track. The coming of the train is usually never good news when trying to get from one part of town to another. Of course, because the trains coming through both Osman and Philo are always ONLY freight, to the average person they represent only potential delay as we see them coming. In other words, we don't get the benefit of train coming as good news... that someone we love is going to arrive, or that we are able to board the train in order to get to a desired destination.

The season of Advent means "coming". We think often of Christmas coming, and certainly the decorations and many preparations for holiday gatherings are a major part of our lives during this time. The church has always considered Advent to be a season to talk more about Christ's coming than 'Christmas preparation'. We teach three such "comings" of Jesus – that He came, once in time, starting as a baby in a manger but then growing up, living among His people, suffering, dying and rising again to defeat sin, death, and the devil for us.

Another way we talk about the coming of Jesus is to talk about His coming again at the end of time – judgment day, when the world will end. While this seems to be a rather abstract concept, as the likelihood of the world ending seems so remote compared to all other things we have to worry about, we are sobered by the realization that Christ's coming for each of us at the "end" is the end of our lives. Still, unless one is actively dying, that does not receive so much attention.

Christ coming among us on a regular basis is the third way that we in church talk about his coming. Christ comes every Sunday to Immanuel Lutheran Church of Osman! Yes... through His word, as we read, study and contemplate His word. Christ also comes regularly through the sacraments. In Baptism, the presence of Christ comes to live within us. Through the sacrament of Holy Communion, Christ comes giving us His power through giving His crucified and resurrected body. Advent is a time that we can think in a renewed interest how we can invite others to come join us on a regular basis... both members who are not as frequent among us, and also others without a church home, to where Jesus comes to us on a regular basis.

Come, Lord Jesus, be our Guest. Jesus is our guest, regularly teaching, forgiving, and feeding us right in our little church at Osman.

Christmas Eve Service

The Sunday School children will be performing a skit written by Pastor McPike for the Christmas Eve Service. The practices will be Saturday, December 10, and Saturday, December 17, from 9 - 10:30 a. m. On Saturday, December 17, the children are invited to a Christmas camp in the hall following practice until 1 p. m. The children will eat lunch, make a craft, bake cookies, and possibly make some more fleece blankets to be given to the homeless in Champaign County. The children will also practice on Sunday, December 18, during Sunday School time. The program will be on Saturday, December 24 at 7 p. m.

Church Council Minutes

<u>Immanuel Lutheran Church of Osman</u>

Church Council Meeting-October 12, 2016

The Immanuel Lutheran Church of Osman held its monthly council meeting on October 12, 2016, with John Lammle presiding. Other members attending were Aaron Warsaw, Bob Zimmerman, Lee Whitehouse, John Gercken, Debbie Lammle, Diana Zimmerman, Shirley Sprau, and Pastor McPike. Pastor McPike opened the meeting with devotion from Psalm 121. Secretary's minutes were read and approved. Treasurer, Bob Zimmerman, agreed to complete his term, but indicated he does not plan to run for a second term. The treasurer's report was read with a balance of \$64,435.93. Aaron Warsaw made a motion to accept the report; Lee Whitehouse seconded; motion carried.

Since the position of treasurer has been difficult to fill in recent years, Helpingstine Accounting in Fisher will be contacted to obtain an estimate of cost should we need to utilize an outside firm starting in 2017.

Discussion was held on the repair of the copier. The service contract ran out in 2013 and the copier has not been serviced since then. Lee Whitehouse made a motion to keep the present copier and service as needed; John Gercken seconded; motion carried.

Pastor's Report: Pastor McPike reported on the 500th anniversary of the posting of Luther's "95 Theses". On October 30th, Immanuel Osman will have a special Reformation Service, with the bulletin printed in German script. The LCMS suggested the following celebrations-November 13th, the nearest date to Martin Luther's birth and baptism; February 19th, the closest date to Luther's death; June 25th recognizing the presentation of the Augsburg Confession; and October 29th recognizing the posting of the 95 Theses. Pastor will use the resource from LCMS called "Faces of the Reformation" for his adult bible study in November. Pastor Ehlers will be filling in on November 6th.

Pastor reported that he will collaborate with Connie Warsaw concerning the Christmas Eve program. Christmas Day service will begin at 10 a.m. with a hymn sing beginning at 9:30 a.m. Communion will be celebrated.

Pastor then informed the council that he was considering leading a mini tour to LCMS sites in St. Louis and Perry County. Sites to be visited would be Concordia seminary, historic Trinity in St. Louis, International Center of LCMS, and other German sites in Perry County. This 2-3 day trip is being considered in late June or early July. It was suggested that Thrivent Choice dollars might be used to help with transportation costs.

Pastor then stated that Kari Genzel and children, Ashley and CJ, transferred from Peace Thomasboro to Immanuel Osman. An acceptance of transfer by voters is required by the constitution. A new member recognition was discussed.

A dedication for the stain glass windows donated by the Frances Zimmerman family and Paul Zimmerman family will be arranged soon.

Chairman Lammle stated that the financial committee and treasurer would collaborate on the 2017 budget and present to the council.

<u>Elder's Report</u>: Elder, Aaron Warsaw, stated that the greeters were a great help during Sunday morning service, especially when newsletters were distributed.

Trustee's Report: Discussion was held on another possible way to improve the current ramp. All agreed to continue with the proposal voted on during the special meeting on September 18th, when it was decided to use concrete for the new ramp. It was suggested that fund raisers could be used to raise money for the ramp project, as well as requesting donations, and using memorial money. Before using memorial money, the families will be contacted for their approval. It was also suggested that the \$7000 targeted for drainage (which might not be needed at this time) could be used on the ramp project. After discussion, the council decided to add the cost of the ramp to the 2017 budget, but contact Shaun Windle to place our name on his schedule for next spring. The quote given is locked in for one year, even though material costs might increase. All agreed that it was prudent to comply with ADA recommendations. Lee Whitehouse was asked to explain the ramp project at the upcoming voters meeting. Lee then discussed small jobs around the church and hall to be completed. Chairman Lammle suggested posting these jobs and soliciting the assistance of those on the Handy Man List.

<u>Church Activities</u>: Chairman Lammle stated that the hay ride and wiener roast was a great success and that Jeri Bidner was surprised with her personal parking sign. The

youth harvest breakfast is being planned by Nikki Gallier. Diana Zimmerman, Shirley Sprau, and Debbie Lammle will work on decorations for the Reformation Fest/Pastor Appreciation event. It was approved by council to bring alcoholic beverages to the event. \$250 will be given to the band with a tip basket out to make up the difference of \$100 per member requested.

The Stewardship Committee, led by Dwight and Terri Hooker and Roy and Annette Whitehouse, are planning a benefit soup supper on November 12th for Jodi Burgess.

Discussion was held on the Thanksgiving Meal before the Service on November 20th. Because of the Warsaw wedding on that same day, the attendance will be decreased. It was decided to continue with the meal, but place a sign-up on the bulletin board to have advance notice of those attending.

<u>Old Business</u>: Two church direction signs were ordered and have been received. Posts and hardware have been purchased and will be installed in October. ILDOT will be notified, as required, after installation has been completed.

Chairman Lammle stated he planned to post the council nominations ballot and a sign-up sheet in December to allow others an opportunity to sign-up for the position. Nominations will also be taken from the floor the day of the election. It was brought up that the head usher position could be filled by an adult.

Chairman Lammle will have a church worker pay and benefit summary ready for the next council meeting. He is also putting together a staff manual which will contain staff pay and benefit summaries along with job descriptions. It will also contain LCMS manual and pay recommendations.

<u>New Business</u>: Chairman Lammle presented the resignation letter of Linda Warsaw as church secretary. Since this is a paid position, the job will be posted on the church bulletin board, along with the job description, so to allow all members the opportunity to apply for the position.

Chairman Lammle will alert Brenda Hendricks of the listing and thank her for a job well done! Council will review the applicants for the secretary's position and chose the best qualified. Chairman Lammle then

solicited the help of the council to modify the job description for the secretary.

Lee Whitehouse made a motion to double Pastor's gift from last year's Pastor Appreciation gift; Debbie Lammle seconded; motion carried.

The meeting ended with the Lord's Prayer.

On Sunday, November 6th, our Sunday School children helped to pack Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes which are sponsored by Samaritan's Purse. "Joy to the World"

If you notice the lyrics of the song, Joy to the World, you will see nothing about shepherds, a manger, wise men, angels, or any other character or element that we normally associate with the Christmas story. The reason being that Isaac Watts did not write Joy to the World to be a Christmas song. The original theme of this song was the second coming of the Lord. Christmas won't always be a joyful time, but when Jesus comes back, even the rocks will sing!



Christmas Tree Tradition

The decorated Christmas tree can be traced back to the ancient Romans who during their winter festival decorated trees with small pieces of metal during Saturnalia, a winter festival in honor of Saturnus, the god of agriculture.

An evergreen, the Paradise tree, was decorated with apples as a symbol of the feast of Adam and Eve held on December 24th during the middle ages.

Christmas trees were sold in Alsace in 1531. Alsace was at that time a part of Germany. Today it is part of France. The trees were sold at local markets and set up in homes undecorated.

Sixteenth century folklore credited **Martin Luther** as being the first to decorate an indoor tree. After a walk through a forest of evergreens with shining stars overhead, Luther tried to describe the experience to his family and showed them by bringing a tree into their home and decorating it with candles

The custom of the Christmas tree was introduced in the United States during the War of Independence by Hessian troops. An early account tells of a Christmas tree set up by American soldiers at Fort Dearborn, Illinois, the site of Chicago, in 1804. Most other early accounts in the United States were among the German settlers in eastern Pennsylvania.

By 1850, the Christmas tree had become fashionable in the eastern states. Until this time, it had been considered a quaint foreign custom.

Franklin Pierce was the first president to introduce the Christmas tree to the White House in 1856 for a group of Washington Sunday School children. The first national Christmas Tree was lighted in the year 1923 on the White House lawn by President Calvin Coolidge.


