Immanuel Lutheran Church of Osman Church Council Meeting- August 16, 2017

The monthly council meeting of the Immanuel Lutheran Church of Osman was held on August 16, 2017. The following members were present: John Lammle, Roy Whitehouse, Dave Kunde, Bob Zimmerman, and Sandy Whitehouse. Pastor McPike was out of town, but sent his Pastor Report ahead of time. Sandy Whitehouse read the minutes from the July council meeting. Dave Kunde made a motion to accept the minutes; Roy Whitehouse seconded; Motion carried.

Treasurer's Report:

• The July 30, 2017 balance was \$64,204.59. Bob Zimmerman reviewed the monthly expenses and year to date totals and how we compare to the budgeted amount. We are on track to what we have budgeted. Dave Kunde made a motion to approve the Treasurer's report; Sandy Whitehouse seconded. Motion carried.

Pastor Report:

- Pastor would like to thank all who were involved in this year's Vacation Bible School program. Though there were not a large number of students who are members here at Osman, it was a great success. There were also 2 other churches within a short distance who also had their VBS programs the same week.
- Thank you also to those who made the annual church picnic a success. There were 53 in attendance, and a good time was had by all.
- Pastor will be starting the Luther Bible study that was purchased for Adult VBS. It will be held on Sunday mornings during the Bible class hour. It gives very good information into Luther and the Reformation. The presentation has a DVD. We can either set up video equipment in the same place we hold Bible study, or we can use the Annex where there is a DVD/TV already set up, however that may interfere with any classes already

using the Annex. Pastor is open to suggestions.

- Pastor's schedule for Fall: Gone on October 15 for his nephew's wedding. Communion will be moved to Oct 22. Pastor Ehlers will be conducting service that day. Nov 6 13, Pastor and Sharon will be out of the country. Pastor Bob Frank will be serving Osman on November 12. Pastor Ehlers will be asked to cover any pastoral emergencies while Pastor McPike is gone.
- Pastor is considering holding another Adult Confirmation class. He has 2 interested but scheduling is an issue. Please spread the word and let Pastor know if we have others interested.
- Pastor was able to rehab an old computer and place it in the Pastor's office. Recordings so far have been very good, probably better than the last computer, as the recording is requiring less edit processing. Pastor will still plan on getting another computer for the office but now this buys some time.

Trustee Report:

- Wheel Chair Ramp project:
- Windle Concrete concrete work is complete.
- Final cost was \$9,512.00.
- We still only have the 1 quote for railings. Creative Iron quote is \$7,457.50 and requires 8 week-lead time.
- Bob Zimmerman will try and obtain another quote.
- Since we are over the budgeted amount, we will need to get voter approval to allocate the extra funds needed to pay for the completion. Several avenues were discussed for the funds.
- New Annex Door- Thank you to Dick Johnson and Don Warsaw for installing the new door to the Annex.

- Thank you to Brenda Hendricks for sealing the wood steps and ramp to the hall.
- Brenda Hendricks would like to allocate some of Mike Hendricks memorial money to the purchase of a new door on the East side of the church.
- Surge Protection for the Church Two quotes have been requested Rob Gallier and Brandon Clemmons. We would also like to have them check if current wiring is adequate for the Church. Because of previous storm damage, it was felt this was needed to be looked into. Quotes will be presented during the September Council Meeting.
- Bob Zimmerman checked with the insurance to see if previous storm damage would be covered. Since we recently bumped up our deductible to \$2500, the damage would not be enough to cover the deductible.
- We are also requesting quotes from Rob Gallier and Brandon Clemmons on replacement of the 2 ceiling fans for the Church Sanctuary. This same work was being considered in 2015, but was tabled until 2016. If upgrade is needed, this expense can be put towards the 2018 budget. The 2015 quote was \$1,000.
- HVAC contract it is felt we would benefit to have an HVAC Maintenance contract in place. By having a contract, we will get faster service and discounts on replacement parts and labor. Steve Martin will request bids from Chief Bauer and JP Heating for both Church and Hall.

Stewardship Committee Report

The committee will meet after Labor Day and plan a benefit for November. One of the recipients could be toward the Reifsteck memorial fund. Another option is to use the Pastor Needy Fund to donate \$500. Dave Kunde made a motion to accept; Roy Whitehouse seconded; Motion carried.

A Note from our Organist...

I am sure that we have all had a teacher or a presenter encourage people to ask questions by saying something like, "If you have a question, ask, because most likely several other people have the same question and will be happy that you asked." I am going to answer the two most common questions people ask me here as well as a question that I have always wanted to answer.

Question 1: Why are there triangles (Δ) on the last verse of some hymns and not others?

Many hymns end with a verse in praise of the Trinity. This verse is called a "doxological stanza." If that term is hard to remember, think of the most famous doxological stanza in the English language, "The Doxology." "The Doxology" or "Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow" was originally written by Thomas Ken as the concluding verse in praise of the Trinity of both his Morning Hymn and also his Evening Hymn. (All of these hymns are in the Lutheran Service Book, numbers 805, 868, and 883 respectively). In many places it is customary to stand up for such a stanza, so the editors of the Lutheran Service Book used a triangle (Δ) to mark the doxological stanzas and indicate that when singing this verse, one should rise. We have a slightly different custom here at Osman, but it is good to know what this symbol means when attending Lutheran rallies and conferences and also services at some of our neighboring congregations.

Question 2: What are the numbers under the hymns?

The numbers under the hymn are the **hymn meter**. These numbers represent the number of syllables in each line of one stanza of the text. Thinking back to the Reverend Ken's famous Doxology, we can count the number of syllables in each line and notice that each stanza contains four lines of eight syllables. This makes the meter 88 88 or Long Meter (LM). The LSB gives three different tunes for Thomas Ken's hymns, but because the meter is the same for all of them, we could use the melodies interchangeably. We could even sing the text of "Lord, Keep Us Steadfast in Your Word," another Long Meter hymn, to one of these tunes or use that tune for "The Doxology." While our Osman congregation sings many tunes, it can be helpful to know how to pair a familiar tune with a new or less familiar text. If you are curious about which tunes are in which meters, there is an index of tunes by meter in the back of the LSB, starting on page 1007.

Which brings me to the question that I just wish someone would ask: What are those words and random letters in all caps at the bottom of the hymns?

The words and seemingly random letters below the hymns are the tune names. Because texts can be sung to a variety of tunes, it is helpful for the tunes to have their own names. Sometimes the tune is named for a text with which it is

frequently paired. For instance, ERHALT UNS HERR, which appears four times in the LSB, was originally used for "Lord Keep Us Steadfast in Your Word" or, in the original German, "Erhalt uns, Herr, bei deinem Wort." Other tunes are named after the place where they were written, or a place significant for the composer. For instance, the tune we use for LSB 733 "O God, Our Help in Ages Past" (ST ANNE) was written by William Croft, the organist at St. Anne's church in Soho, London. If a tune name looks like it came out of a random-letter generator, it's a good bet that it's Welsh. LLANFAIR (Hail the Day That Sees Him Rise), for instance, means "St. Mary's Church" and is pronounced something like "hchlanvire." And some names defy understanding. For instance, the tune for LSB 677, "For All the Saints," is named SINE NOMINE, which is Latin for "without name." Why did Ralph Vaughan Williams do that? That's on my list of questions to ask God when I get to heaven. I'm sure some of the other saints are wondering the same thing.

Breast Cancer Awareness Month

October is breast cancer awareness month. Is heredity the biggest risk factor for developing breast cancer? What about wearing certain bras or deodorants? When it comes to identifying risk factors for breast cancer, can you identify fact from fiction? In 2017, the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG) released guidelines for breast cancer risk assessment and screening in averagerisk women. These guidelines help us determine what the scientific literature says about how our heredity and lifestyle choices impact our risk.

Breast cancer risks include:

- Family history of breast cancer, ovarian cancer, or other hereditary breast and ovarian syndrome-associated cancer (prostate, pancreatic cancer).
- Known breast cancer gene mutation
- Prior breast biopsy with atypical or abnormal changes
- Early menarche (menses)
- Late menopause
- Never been pregnant
- Prolonged interval between menarche and first pregnancy
- Menopausal hormone therapy with estrogen and progesterone.
- Not breastfeeding
- Increasing age
- Certain ethnicities (breast cancer gene mutation in Ashkenazi Jewish women)
- Higher body mass index
- Smoking
- Alcohol consumption
- Dense breasts on mammography
- Prior exposure to high-dose therapeutic chest irradiation at age 10-30 years old.

The goal of screening for cancer is to detect disease early in healthy, asymptomatic people, to prevent adverse outcomes, improve survival, and avoid the need for more intensive treatments. Screening tests have both benefits (eg. improved health outcomes) and adverse consequences (eg. cost, anxiety, false-positive results, overdiagnosis, Overdiagnosis occurs when screening overtreatment). detects cancer that would not have progressed to symptoms if left undetected. Overtreatment is initiating treatment for this cancer. It's not ethically permissible to do natural history studies of untreated disease so frequency of overdiagnosing is hard to evaluate. Research to develop better prognostic indicators of progression versus nonprogression cancers may allow more customized treatment in the future, thereby reducing overtreatment. Summary of recommendations.

Recommendations based on good and consistent scientific evidence.

• Women at average risk of breast cancer should be offered screening mammography starting at age 40 years, no earlier and no later than age 50 years. The decision about what age to start screening should be made through

a shared decision making process.

- Women of average risk should have screening mammography every 1-2 years. Biennial screening after age 55 is a reasonable option to reduce frequency of harms but with some reduction in benefit.
- Women of average risk should continue screening to at least age 75 years.

Recommendations based on limited or inconsistent scientific evidence.

- Health care providers periodically should assess your risk by reviewing your history.
- Women with a potentially increased risk of breast cancer based on the initial history should have further assessment.

Breast self-exam is not recommended in average-risk women because there is a risk of harm from false positive results and a lack of evidence of benefit.

Recommendations based primarily on consensus and expert opinion.

- Screening clinical exam may be offered to asymptomatic, average-risk women. If performed for screening, intervals of every 1-3 years for women aged 25-39 and annually for women aged 40 years and older are reasonable. The clinical breast exam continues to be a recommended part of the exam in high-risk women and women with symptoms.
- Average-risk women should be counseled about breast self-awareness and encouraged to notify their health care provider if changes noted. Breast self-awareness is defined as a woman's awareness of the normal appearance and feel of her breasts.

Age alone should not be the basis to continue or discontinue screening mammography. Beyond age 75 years, the decision to screen should be based on a shared decision making process informed by the woman's health status and longevity.

The American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists 2017 practice guidelines .

There are several national guidelines. Ask your provider which one they use.
