From the desk of Pastor McPike...

Sitting, standing, kneeling, oh my! On the meaning of posture in worship.

Kneeling? Ok... now I have your attention. Not to worry. Immanuel/Osman has no kneelers. The following, however, is a discussion of the reason that we stand, sit, and other postures as a part of our worship.

Sitting needs little by way of explanation. Sitting is a natural posture for us, and one that encourages listening. We sit because we get tired of standing, because it is more of an "at rest" posture in a group, allowing us to concentrate on other things.

Kneeling is a sign of humility. In ancient times, people would kneel when in the presence of someone of importance, such as a king. Kneeling before someone is body language for "you are greater, I humble myself before you." Times when kneeling in a liturgical (traditional) worship service include:

*Confession of sins. By our body language, we are saying that we are sorry before God.

*Prayer. Kneeling before God is humbling ourselves, even as we are bold to pray because God invites us to pray.

*Reception of Communion. We are invited into the presence of the King, to dine at His table. Yet we are unworthy sinners! Kneeling is a reminder of that. (Again... it is not *wrong* to stand, or even *improper*... we have no rail at which to kneel for communion at our church).

Standing is a sign of respect. Just as those in attendance stand in the courtroom, so we stand as we recognize that we are in the presence of the God of all that exists. Typical times to stand in services are:

*At the beginning. The opening words of the Divine Service invoke the name of the Triune God. We stand in respect.

*For the reading of the Holy Gospel. While each Scripture lesson is "from God" as it comes from the Bible, the Gospels are special in that they talk about Jesus and most often directly quote Him.

*For prayer. When we cannot kneel for prayer, we stand out of respect.

*During the early part of the service of Communion. Jesus is about to "show up" by providing His body and blood for us to eat and drink.

*For "Doxological" stanzas of hymns (stanzas that specifically give praise to the Trinity, mentioning each person by name). These stanzas are also denoted with a small "triangle" next to them in the hymnal. (The tradition is to also put an "Amen" at the end of hymns where there are such stanzas)

*When receiving the blessing at the end of the service. God is speaking His "final word of the day".

Bowing is also a body posture that can be devotional. Some bow at the mention of the Trinity, some at the mention of the name of Jesus. Some Christians bow during the portion of the Creed which specifically talks about Jesus "becoming man" when He was in His state of humiliation. (The *State of Humiliation* has nothing to do with Jesus being embarrassed. It is the period of His earthly life between conception and death when He did no always nor fully use His divine powers as God.)

Right? or Wrong? NEITHER!! As with any of these customs, they are just that. There is no "right" way or "wrong" way. The only "wrong" thing that is done is insisting that there is a "right" way or "wrong" way, or considering someone's way of doing something as "wrong" and one's own way as "right". While the Bible gives some examples of posture used in Old Testament worship, it says absolutely nothing about commanding or forbidding one's posture in worship as "Right" or "wrong". What we should pay attention to is "meaning". Why are we doing these things? Because they have meaning? Do we know what they mean? Do they enhance or detract from worship? If the former, then they can be good. If the latter, it can best that they not be done.

With many of these customs, there is also an *accepted* way that they are done which is shared with many other churches. This helps not only reinforce the meaning, but provides consistency among sister congregations and continuity with the history of the church.

Here at Osman, we stand for the final stanza of the opening and closing hymn. Some churches stand for the entire first and/or last hymn; others not at all; others only when the processional cross is used. There may a long standing tradition that I don't know about which is the reason that we do it this way here (if so, if you know please tell me!)

St. Paul says that things should be done "decently and in order" (1 Corinthians 14:40). This indicates that for any of these devotional practices in worship, the most important thing is to do what makes the most sense and agree on it.

Posture is important, both in the message it communicates to others. If you slouch, yawn and look distracted when someone is talking to you, for example... what are you "saying" to them? BORING!! We stand out of respect for our God. We sit attentively when needed. What we do in the church should be meaningful and assist us in the worship of our great God. At the same time, being told that we need to change be cause "we are wrong" when the Bible clearly does not indicate a practice to be either right or wrong is, in and of itself, inappropriate and disruptive.

Standing for the final stanza

Moving forward, what makes the most sense is to continue the local tradition here at Osman to stand for the last stanza of the first and last hymn in each service. However, whenever another hymn of the service has a "doxological" stanza (indicated by the triangle in next to the last stanza in the hymnal), we will also stand for that. Additionally, the "signal" that we will stand for those hymn stanzas will be a bit of an organ interlude. Also, since observing that portion of the "tradition", I suggest that we also place an "Amen" at the end. (The hymnal many of us grew up with had an "Amen" at the end of each hymn; the "blue hymnal" that came before our current book took them all out. The oldest tradition is that "Amen" is placed at the end of doxological stanzas, which I'm proposing that we do). Standing for the hymns with doxological stanzas - the ones with triangles after them, and singing an "Amen" after will allow us to be more in line with practices in our sister LCMS congregations, which promotes uniformity and reduces confusion, both when members of Osman visit elsewhere and when other LCMS Lutherans visit Osman.

Health Notes from our Parish Nurse

January is Glaucoma Awareness Month

Glaucoma is a group of diseases that damage the eye's optic nerve and can result in vision loss and even blindness. About 3 million Americans have glaucoma and it is the 2nd leading cause of blindness worldwide. Openangle glaucoma, the most common form, results in increased eye pressure. There are often no early symptoms, which is why 50% of people with glaucoma don't know they have the disease. There is no cure (yet) for glaucoma, but if it's detected early, you can preserve your vision and prevent vision loss. Taking action to preserve your vision health is key. Anyone can get glaucoma, but certain groups are at higher risk. These groups include African Americans over age 40, all people over age 60 people with a family history of glaucoma, and people who have diabetes. People with diabetes are 2 times more likely to get glaucoma than people without diabetes. There are many steps you can take to help protect your eyes and lower your risk of vision loss from glaucoma.

- If you are in a high-risk group, get a comprehensive dilated eye exam to detect glaucoma early and start treatment. Prescription eye drops can stop glaucoma from progressing. Your eye care specialist will recommend how often to return for follow-up exams. Medicare covers a glaucoma test once a year for people in high-risk groups.
- Even if you are not in a high-risk group, getting a comprehensive dilated eye exam by the age of 40 can help detect glaucoma and other eye diseases early.
- Open-angle glaucoma does not have symptoms and is hereditary, so talk to your family members about their vision health to help protect your eyes—and theirs
- Maintaining a healthy weight, controlling your blood pressure, being physically active, and avoiding smoking will help you avoid vision loss from glaucoma. These healthy behaviors will also help prevent type 2 diabetes and other chronic conditions.

Vision loss from glaucoma usually affects peripheral vision. Later, it will affect your central vision. Glaucoma is treated with eye drops, oral medicines, or surgery (or a combination of treatments) to reduce pressure in the eye and prevent permanent vision loss. Take medicine as prescribed, and tell your eye care specialist about any side effects. You and your doctor are a team. If laser or surgical procedures are recommended to reduce the pressure in your eye, make sure to schedule regular follow-up visits to continue to monitor eye pressure. This year, take steps towards protecting your eyes and the vision health of your loved ones by learning about glaucoma and other eye diseases. Know the facts, know the risks, and take action!
