From Pastor McPike's Desk...

Sacred Space

What comes to mind when you think of "Sacred Space"? Another word for it would be "Holy Space" as "Sacred" means basically, holy, or that which reminds us of the holy. The Bible mentions any number of places where spaces were considered sacred. Genesis 32 records the story of Jacob "wrestling with God", and he called the place where it happens he called "Peniel" which is Hebrew for "Face of God". God had already made it known that His holiness and sin could not exist in the same space. Therefore, God's face is the face of holiness, and Jacob realizes the blessing of being in the same space as God and not being wiped out.

Moses was told of sacred space on the top of Mount Sinai while the Israelites were still in slavery. Exodus 3 records the incident with the burning bush, where Moses was told to remove his shoes. God then spoke to him from the bush, and told him that he was to be the leader of God's people in order to get them out of slavery and mistreatment.

A sort of "portable" sacred space was created by the creation of the holy place in the tent church called the "tabernacle". This the Israelites carried with them from the time they left Mount Sinai until they reached the promised land. Once settled in the capitol city, Jerusalem, the Israelites were determined to make permanent the tabernacle structure and outline, resulting in the temple. In both the tabernacle and temple, the sacred space was called the "holy of holies" or "holy place". It held various appointments, including Moses' staff, the ark of the covenant, and the tables of the Ten commandments. Only one priest was allowed

into the holy place once each year and then only after the thing was so full of smoke that nobody could really see much of any of the inside.

Traditionally constructed church buildings sought to capture this "holy place" or "holy space" concept. While the entire structure can be considered a holy place, the area of the church called the chancel, where the pulpit, lectern, altar and related appointments reside is generally thought to somewhat parallel the "most holy place" in the old Jerusalem Temple. Indeed, in Lutheran Churches until a few decades ago, those working in that portion of the church customarily refrained from idle "chit-chat" as that was the place representing the presence of God.

The purpose of "sacred spaces" is to put one in the "mood" or create an atmosphere of being in communion with God. Think of our varied experiences here at Osman – when we would have worship at the park for our annual picnic, or worship in the hall when our church was being repaired; well... it just wasn't quite the same.

Because we are being encouraged to practice "social distancing" to help slow the spread of the Covid-19 virus, we have lost access to gathering in our "sacred space". We are disconnected from each other, all members of the body of Christ, as a bunch of disconnected bricks of the same building scattered randomly in a field.

A challenge, then, is to find creative ways to recreate "sacred space" in this interim period. One way is to choose a particular place in your home; turn off phones, cell phones, televisions, radios or any other distractions. Perhaps light a candle or two at a space

that might come close to representing an altar. And in that space, engage with God through His word. If you have the ability, play the worship service that has been uploaded to Osmanlutheran.org website. If not, read the lessons, Old Testament, Epistle, and Gospel for that week (you can find that on another of my websites, http://yaag.org). While you are there, think about others in our fellowship. While it won't be the same as being in church, it can be useful to recreate church where you are.

Don't forget your offerings!

It goes without saying that while we are being kept apart during the viral outbreak, our church continues to have expenses and will need your ongoing support. Please consider setting aside, or mailing in your contribution so that we don't get woefully behind. Certainly, these are trying times for all!

Due to the COVID-19 Virus guidelines, all these activities will be pending the decisions made by the Church Council and Pastor McPike.

Maundy Thursday

On Thursday, the "first day of Unleavened Bread", Jesus sent two disciples to locate a room and prepare for the Passover, the Last Supper. During this meal, Jesus instituted the Sacrament of the Altar, giving His disciples His body and blood under the bread and wine of the meal. He also washed the disciples' feet. Judas left during this meal to complete his act of betraying Jesus. Jesus then led the remaining 11 apostles to Gethsemane, where He secluded Himself and His inner circle-Peter, James, and John, for prayer, asking the Father to spare Him the crucifixion if possible, but accepting His Father's will that He die for us and our sins. Sometime during the evening, perhaps while Jesus prayed, the day passed into Friday.

Good Friday

Judas brought soldiers of the chief priests to arrest Jesus, identifying Him with a kiss. Jesus was taken to Annas and then to the high priest, Caiaphas. There the soldiers mocked and beat Jesus while Peter denied Him in the courtyard. At daylight, the Sanhedrin condemned Jesus for blasphemy and took Him for sentencing. Pilate first sent Jesus to King Herod, the king of Galilee because Jesus was a Galilean. Herod sent Jesus back to Pilate in a royal robe. Pilate initially refused the Jewish leaders' request for a death sentence. He had Jesus flogged and mocked Him further with a crown of thorns and a reed scepter. The crowds called for Jesus to be crucified and in the end Pilate relented. Pilate washed his hands of the matter, released the prisoner Barabbas, and sentenced Jesus to be crucified. Jesus carried His own cross assisted at some point by Simon of Cyrene. Jesus was nailed to the cross at the "third hour" (about 9am) and died about the ninth hour(3pm). His body was removed from the cross and rushed to burial in a nearby tomb before sundown.

Easter Sunday

A new day and a new week dawned with an earthquake, as an angel rolled back the stone sealing Jesus' tomb. Several women among the disciples, coming with spices to complete the burial preparations, found the tomb empty, and angels announced Jesus' resurrection. The women hurried back to report to the apostles, and Peter and John raced to the tomb, where they confirmed that Jesus was not there. Jesus appeared that day to Mary Magdalene, the women, Simon, Cleopas, and another disciple on the road to Emmaus, and ten of the apostles in the Upper Room. Jesus had risen just as He said, winning forgiveness, life, and salvation for us all!

More is being learned about Williams Syndrome and we pray she will have more opportunities to help her in the future. They are so very thankful for your loving support!
