From Pastor McPike's Desk...

Since April 2022, various parts of LCMS history have been presented in this column. This month, I am deviating a bit from LCMS history and going back to 1523. This year is the 500th Anniversary of the release of Luther's revision of the Latin Mass, the "Formulae MIssae 1523". This actually does tie together as a natural 14th installment of this series of history.

In 1054, the church "officially" divided for the first time. In the early days, there were several church "centers" or "sees" that were each considered equal to one another. Among them were Rome, Constantinople (now Istanbul), Alexandria, and Antioch. Jerusalem was considered a center because of its importance in the earliest days of Christianity. By the middle of the first millennium, Rome was beginning to assert itself as what they referred to as "first among equals." This grew into a rivalry between Rome (really the only "western" see) and Constantinople, a see that was looked to in a leadership way among the eastern sees. This "rivalry" gradually grew into a division fueled by several factors. Rome asserted the use of Latin, while Constantinople, while dominated by Greek, allowed for the *vernacular* (the language spoken in that land). Rome became the head of the "Western Church" while Constantinople was head of the "Eastern Church". Rome promoted the idea that the "Bishop of Rome" (later called the Pope) was actually a leader not only of Rome but of the entire Christian Church on earth. Eastern Churches rejected that and held that the Bishop of each city was equal to any other Bishop. There was also a point of doctrine, expressed as a controversial addition to the Nicene Creed. The Western church inserted that the Holy Spirit proceeds from the father *and the son*, while the eastern church asserted that was not correct, and that the Holy Spirit proceeds from the Father alone.

The year 1054 is known as *The Great Schism*, where the Bishop of Rome (Pope) and the Bishop of Constantinople (Patriarch) excommunicated each other and each other's churches. From that point on, the Western Church became known as the Roman Catholic Church, while the Eastern Church became known as the "Orthodox" (or Greek Orthodox) Church.

The insistence on the use of Latin for worship became even more firmly in place after the two churches split. Latin was already in use by 382 AD when St. Jerome translated the Bible from Hebrew/Greek into Latin. By 1500 when Martin Luther was coming of age, the Latin language had dominated the Western church for over 1000 years.

By the sixteenth century, Latin was the language of academia and the church, but very little else. In other words, in German lands, people spoke German, but didn't understand Latin except maybe a phrase or two. Yet when they would go to church, all the singing and reading would be in Latin.

As the Reformation moved forward after the events of 1517 to 1521, there was a call for worship services and hymns in German rather than Latin. Luther encouraged the writing of hymns but was slow to change the format of the worship service. When he did finally release a service, the "Formula Missae" or "Order of the Mass" in 1523, he retained all the main parts of the Latin Mass, taking out only things that he felt were not consistent with the Bible. Readings, sermon, and the like were now done in German, but he felt that since people had worshiped that way for so long, that basic part of their worship should only be changed VERY SLOWLY.

Luther's reason for SLOW change was to not upset those who had been brought up with a certain type of worship. Even when change is good, it can end up becoming a point of contention that takes away from the worship of the faithful. Many ceremonies of the church have great meaning and enhance worship. Slow change allows for the true meaning of that which is being introduced to be a blessing to those gathered for worship.
