From Pastor McPike's Desk...

The Importance of Baptism

Last month, I told you about my "pilgrimage" to St. Peter Lutheran Church in Indianapolis where I was baptized. To recap, on the last Sunday of the church year in 1960, I was baptized at St. Peter Lutheran Church where my parents had been attending since their move to Indy a couple of years before. Before I have memory, they changed to a church closer to where they had moved on the far east side of the city, Trinity Lutheran Church of Indianapolis. I attended school at Trinity from Kindergarten through Grade 7, at which time we moved to Martinsville, Indiana.

I wanted to continue discussion of baptism just a bit this month because of the First Sunday after Epiphany. Each year, that Sunday celebrates the Baptism of Jesus. Baptism, then, is the topic for this month.

The importance of Baptism cannot be overemphasized. Baptism is our birth into the Christian Church. While it is possible to come to faith through the hearing of the Word of God, Baptism is commanded by God. In Matthew 28, as Jesus was about to ascend into heaven after His resurrection from the dead, He gave the command to make disciples. The two directives of that command were baptism and instruction. As Jesus welcomed little children despite the disciples attempt to keep them away (ref), He thus tells us that even infants can believe. This is told to us as faith is not merely an intellectual exercise. The Holy Spirit works faith in our hearts. This, of course, is in contrast to those church bodies that hold that faith is only an intellectual exercise, leading them to withhold Baptism until one can make their own confession and "ask for it."

Baptism washes away sins. Baptism makes one a child of God. Baptism gives the gift of the Holy Spirit. So why, then, did the sinless son of God need baptizing? This question, first posed by Jesus' cousin at the Jordan River, brings into focus the purpose of Baptism both for Jesus and for us. When the sinless Son of God was washed with baptismal water, He took upon Himself the sin that Baptismal water washes from all of us. Baptism marks the beginning of a life of faith in a Christian. Baptism marks the beginning of the ministry of Jesus that would be completed at the cross and empty tomb.

Remembering Baptism is important. By "remembering", for those baptized as infants, it is

obvious that we are not remembering the event like we would remember Confirmation or a Wedding. Part of the charge to parents and sponsors in Baptism is that they would remind the person often of their Baptism. That starts with simply telling the person about Jesus and how Jesus saved them in the water of Baptism. Parents, sponsors, and the church bear witness to an event not remembered in time by the baptized. Through the parents, sponsors, and the church, the person "remembers their Baptism."





The second picture shown here shows the former location of the Baptismal font at St. Peter Lutheran Church in Indy. Where I am shown standing below the symbols is where the font was located for many years, where it was when I was baptized in 1960. Many churches chose to have "baptistry areas" which were off to the side from the focal point of the church. This has changed recently.

Like we have done at Osman, St. Peter relocated their baptismal font to the front of the center aisle. Unlike Osman, St. Peter's font cannot be moved. For one thing, it is solid marble, and thus very heavy. For another, a marble base has been made that has eight sides. Many baptismal fonts have eight sides, as eight is the number in the Bible that represents regeneration. Four is the number that represents the human race, and eight, then, is "four made over", symbolizing regeneration. In baptism, we are regenerated.

There is rich symbolism to be gained in locating the font at the front aisle. We see it all the time as we look to the front of the church. We pass it when coming up the aisle to approach the altar. That is significant, as we are only acceptable to God through forgiveness, and forgiveness is given in Baptism. Frequent reminders of Baptism are frequent reminders that we are God's children, have been given faith, and look forward to being in heaven with Him forever.


